

up-do hairstyle made popular by the beautiful star from Breakfast at Tiffany's has started to see a come back with modern brides looking for a simple yet sophisticated style.





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#### TOP TECH TIPS

Being the adventurous sort I usually cope with the challenges bad weather brings. As the Council's Grit supplies dwindled recently, I had to admit that the 1-in-4 hill near my house was not safe to drive on at times. We switched to the bus for the daily school/office run for a few days last month, but then the school closures finally triggered my inner 'Grumpy Old Woman' to come out singing:-

#### Oh the weather outside is shocking, And the roads are all gridlocking. Dropping kids off at school is 'no-go'. Flippin' Ice! Blinkin' Slush! Bl\*\*\*y Snow!

While kids aren't exactly disappointed if school's closed, I am! In a small business like ours it's 'all hands to the pump' most of the time. Work can't stop just because of a bit of snow, or anything else, so solid fall-back plans are essential.

Making the most of currently available technology, really can mean 'Business As Usual' from the comfort of home. Remote Desktop Services is built into Windows Business/Professional Editions. Apple sell their own Remote Desktop as an add-on to Mac OS X. Both enable you to work as if you are sitting right in front of a computer that could be anywhere in the world. You need a broadband internet connection between the computer, laptop or mobile client device you are using (yes, even some mobile phones are capable!) and the remote host computer in your office.

Some business networks and Professional/Business Edition Windows PCs are already configured to allow remote desktop connectivity. In some cases you can even wake up your computer if it's powered off!

If your office computer is Windows Home Edition or MacOS, or your business network is not configured to allow direct connections through, there are a number of third-party software solutions enabling you to set up a connection quickly and easily, many via a web browser, with very little technical knowledge needed.

Most products are downloadable. In some cases they offer basic functionality free of charge. If you want to do more, e.g. printing from your office computer to your home computer's local printer, hear audio, or transfer files between the two, you should probably go for a fully licensed product/subscription.

A word of caution though – in businesses where client confidentiality and data security are essential, high level encryption may be required, or remote working may be completely inappropriate. Getting your employer's permission to 'remote desktop' is essential!

Why not ask your boss about building your fall-back plan ready for the next time bad weather or childcare problems disrupt your ability to reach the office?


During this fight/flight response, a number of physiological changes occur, which prepare the body to respond aggressively to a perceived threat:

- Adrenalin production increases.
- The immune system weakens.
- The production of sex hormonesdecreases.

Numerous scientific studies have evidenced that chronic stress accelerates aging and makes you more vulnerable to serious illnass including boost disease bish blood

illness, including heart disease, high blood pressure, cancer, panic attacks, immune deficiency, depression, stomach ulcers, chronic fatigue, and migraine headaches When you feel overwhelmed or anxious, it is easy to forget that you have choices and that there are many tools and techniques that can help you to feel better right away, a couple of these are yoga and meditation. A regular practice of yoga can help bring balance to mind, body & spirit, and when your mental, physical and emotional selves are working in harmony with one another, you can experience clarity, a sense of wellbeing, calmness, peace of mind and enthusiasm for life.

Meditation gives you the experience of pure, restful awareness. As you meditate, the bodily reactions are exactly the opposite of the stress response: your breathing slows, blood pressure decreases and stress hormone levels fall. #### Still wondering about Fairtrade?

The Fairtrade Mark was introduced to guarantee that the producers of bananas, cocoa, tea etc were getting a 'fair' price for the crop. This is because they were basically held to ransom at harvest time to the World market prices and had to accept anything they could get, even if it meant less than they needed to pay for the workers, their land, rent, even food for their families, etc.

The Fairtrade Foundation is 15 years old but the fair trade idea has been around for 40 years or more

What has happened to the idea of Fairtrade during this time?

There are strict monitoring rules before a product gains the Fairtrade Mark, that's why it is so important, and it is the ONLY mark guaranteed to address poverty, not only paying above the market price and never dropping below the agreed minimum figure but also paying a premium which goes to develop the community, schools, housing, whatever they decide is most needed.

There are now thousands of products carrying the Fairtrade Mark, cosmetics, cotton, shoes, footballs, wine, beer etc. The biggest food sales come from bananas and coffee. Supermarkets and coffee chains are embracing the idea responding to consumer choice and demand. This is where individuals play their part, we can't change the whole world but we can make changes in our own lives and shopping habits which in turn DO make a change for the better in the lives of people at the other side of the world. So in effect you have changed the world albeit a purchase at a time!

One of the more recent increases which had a huge impact on the cocoa farmers in Ghana was when Cadbury changed all the cocoa purchasing for Dairy Milk to Fairtrade. it is hoped that this won't change with the recent take-over.

Fairtrade Towns, Cities, Zones, Counties, Boroughs, Countries, Islands are now all over the world and millions of ordinary people with a conscience come together with a passion to ensure the life that we take for granted can be enjoyed by the people who strive to provide our luxuries.

The impact that the Fairtrade Town movement has had reaches far beyond it's own certified products and by campaigning on ethical and moral issues, the whole consumer business has changed. It may be naive to believe that one day all trade will be fair but surely anyone who answered 'no' to the opening question can doubt that it's good that at least this issue is being addressed. 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### Sweetheart tart for the Casanova in your Kitchen

Sumptuous, rich, lavish, indulgent and perfect for spoiling that special someone on Valentine's day – and simplicity itself. So even if you're stunned by their smile and senseless in their presence, you'll still be able to whip this up and watch their knees go weak from the very first mouthful. This is unbelievably good...and if there isn't a special someone to share it with, then all the better – because, after all, you're worth it! Sumptuous, rich, lavish, indulgent and it if your hands are trembling already....] With a sharp knife, cut another heart shape inside the first, about an inch or so smaller all the way around – but don't cut all the way through the pastry. 1 block ready made puff pastry (thawed if needed) 150g chocolate (dark or milk, whichever you prefer) 150ml condensed milk 150 ml (or so) double cream, whipped strawberries, raspberries or cherries to top with – about 20 – 25 at the most Heat the oven to gas mark 7 /220 / 425

Roll out the pastry into a circle about half an inch deep and place on a floured baking tray.

Cut a heart shape (you might want to cut a template out of paper first and cut around

it if your hands are trembling already....) With a sharp knife, cut another heart smaller all the way around - but don't cut all the way through the pastry. Make diagonal scores across the central heart shape and bake for around 15 minutes until crisp and risen, but not burnt! Take out of the oven and, while still warm. gently lift away the top layers of pastry from the INNER heart shape. This will leave you a heart shaped shell. Once this has cooled, melt the chocolate and condensed milk together in the microwave on full power for 1 minute. Take out and stir very well until the mixture becomes smooth and glossy. Spread mixture inside the tart. Whip the double cream and spread around the inside inch or so of the tart shell, and decorate with the berries and any heart shaped trimmings from the spare pastry.

Best eaten horizontal with a large spoon and a daft grin on your face. Nel Hargrave

#### Carry On Farming

When you think of farming, you think of cows grazing in a lush green field, or gathering the hay in the hot sunshine. It's been a different story more recently... We all need water to live, but in excess

we can't manage this natural asset. November was a particularly wet month, with heavy downpours causing rivers and streams to flash flood, then back up and flood yet more land. With the land being underwater, some crop damage is evident once

the water has receded. Brown puddles last for a month or so, with the grass having gone slimy underwater. Then there's the animals. There's a farmer who I know very well, who keeps a close eye on the downfalls and any hint of heavy rain and the lambs are moved to higher ground. One particular Sunday, just as we were supplementary feeding the sheep and hoggs, a brief glance down the valley spurs a Lamb Moving Session. The river was at a level with the banking and ready to burst at any point. Gathering up 200 or so lambs with two men (well, one lady) and a sheepdog against the driving rain was not going to be easy. The lambs were well sheltered under a belt of trees, not knowing this was one of the lower fields in the valley bottom. Getting them to shift was not welcomed, even with the dog. Eventually, after a lot of arm waving and shouting at the lambs, they began to 'trail' the way we wanted. The aim being to get every lamb safe and sound on higher ground at the field furthest away from where we were... Sunday Lunch was

looking more like Sunday Tea. I was really impressed by the sheepdog. She was well practised at this routine, keeping a good fifty feet to my left and the farmer another fifty feet to her left. If any lambs tried to make a break, she had them covered as

> they were soon returned to the rest of the flock. The rain got stronger and the winds colder, by heck we felt it as we were already soaked to the skin, but we had to carry on – the river had now burst its banks and was running into the fields where the

photo James Hutton lambs were. Soon the wool was drenched and we all know how heavy this can be when its wet. The lambs got slower, we got more tired, but had to press on. Some of the lambs stopped and refused to go any further. There was nothing else for it, they had to be taken to higher ground one way or another. So, they got a free ride. Some in the LandRover and the odd few carried by the farmer over his shoulder. With the river getting higher there was no time for messing about. You have to admire that in a farmer. A job needs doing, so they just get on with it. No moaning, even in these conditions.

We finally got the lambs to the higher field. They were all gathered together and fed supplementary feed to boost their energy. At least we knew they were safe and wouldn't be washed away. Following the downpours of rain causing

widespread flooding, comes the gentle white snow flakes. They don't cause any harm, I hear you say... I love snow. Everything looks so clean and refreshing, especially when it's sunny. Then again, I don't have to work in it every day.
