This cake benefits greatly for being wrapped tightly and left to mature for a few days making it sticky and chewy so please be patient with it! Ingredients 100 grams golden syrup 25 grams black treacle 75 grams butter 75 grams soft brown sugar 175 grams soft brown sugar 175 grams self-rising flour 1 1/2 teaspoons ground ginger 1 pinch of salt 1 egg (small, beaten) 1 tablespoon of milk

Jacques would like to thank all his customers for their business over the years. Pre- heat the oven to gas mark 1, 275F or 140C. Grease and line a loaf tin.
 First weigh a saucepan on the scales and then weigh in it the syrup, treacle, sugar and butter, place over a gentle heat and let the butter melt, don't let it boil.
 Meanwhile in a bowl put the flour, porridge oats, salt and ginger. Once the syrup mixture has melted stir into the dry ingredients. Once combined add the egg and milk.

4 Pour into the tin and cook for about an hour in the middle of the oven, or until the centre feels springy to the touch.
5 Let it cool for 30 mins in the tin before turning it out and allowing to cool fully before wrapping and maturing it. Enjoy.

Just a note on the oatmeal: if you can't find medium oatmeal buy porridge oats and blitz them for a few seconds in a food processor; do not over-do this, you want rough crumbs, not dust.



When you enter Glusburn you may wonder what is the beautiful building with a dome and clock tower on the top? What you see is Glusburn Community and Arts Centre, also known as Glusburn Institute by local people.

The Institute is not only a historical building and the centre of village life, it is also a symbol of great vision from mill owner Sir John Horsfall (1846-1920). As a young man he must have witnessed the terrible conditions of some factory workers; long hours, poor pay, brutality in the mills, drunkenness, money spent in the alehouse and hungry children. He didn't want his employees to suffer these conditions; he wanted them to see their homes and families as a priority. For that reason in 1892 the Institute was built, as a religious, social and educational centre to help improve local people's lives.

It is not an exaggeration to say, that every event of any importance was held at the Institute since it was built. There was the Cricket Club, The Bowling Club, the annual Exhibition and Festival, the Big Christmas Tree in the Main Hall, the Drama Group, the Youth Club and the Pensioners Tea, and of course the outstanding event of the year; three day 'Conversaziones'. Starting on Thursday with people arriving by horse and carriage for what was called locally as the 'Posh Night', Friday was 'Children's Night' with a performance followed by dancing and games and Saturday was the 'Everyone's Night'.

We don't have Sir John Horsfall anymore to organise social events and yet they still happen, time has passed but his spirit remains. This spirit you will surely feel and recognise when you visit Glusburn Institute.





September 2014 coincided with National Eye Health Week, with a large drive to raise the awareness of both maintaining eye health, and eye diseases which affect the UK today.

Age-related macular degeneration (AMD) is Britain's leading cause of blindness and usually develops in people aged 50 and over. AMD is a painless eye condition that leads to the loss of central vision. An individual's central vision allows them to see what is directly in front of them, with AMD vision will become increasingly blurred leading to difficulty reading text, colours appearing less vibrant, difficulty recognising people's faces, and straight lines such as door frames can appear distorted or bent. Macular degeneration does tend to be more common in women than in men.

There are two main types of macular degeneration; Dry AMD is the most common form and affects around 90% of patients. Wet AMD is more aggressive & causes a rapid loss of central vision caused by leaking vessels, so fast referral for treatment is necessary. People affected with Wet AMD will begin to notice shadowy areas and/or distortion in their central vision (see below).

Smoking, age, sunlight/UV exposure and diet all play a role in the development of AMD, as well as gender, blood pressure and genetics.

Unfortunately, there are no treatments for Dry AMD. Wet AMD is currently treated with an injection into the eye. AMD sufferers are encouraged to adopt certain lifestyle changes such as maintaining a healthy diet which includes fish and plenty of green vegetables, stopping smoking, and wearing good quality UV protecting sunglasses when outdoors.

Your Optometrist is able to check for Macular Degeneration as part of your routine eye examination, they will also provide advice if you have any signs of the condition, or refer you to a specialist if urgent care is needed.

Ocular Coherence Tomography (OCT) is being used by a handful of Optometrists in the Aire Valley area to detect the very earliest signs of any Macular Degeneration. The OCT is like a detailed ultrasound of the retina; it's painless and gives results instantly as to the health of the macula. It is also used to diagnose the very earliest signs of Glaucoma, retinal detachments and many other eye conditions.

Sloe Stew Slow

Still finding uses for the produce from that bountiful afternoon last month, I decided to use my sloe and crabapple jelly in a simple venison stew. Simple but careful cooking can result in something really tasty that expresses autumn's fanfare of flavours. I have been so pleased to find other uses for sloes, and I so love fruit jellies in savoury, meaty dishes, that this seemed an obvious choice. Blackberries are often cooked with venison; they are flavours from the same season and a deliciously well-suited match. So the sloe and crab-apple jelly should be too!

Using a game meat makes the stew a bit different, and the price was not much more than for beef. Venison is lower in fat to other red meats, and gives a lovely flavour.

I was determined to make a really richly tasty concoction. so the first thing I did was to ask the butcher for a beef bone to roast slowly for several hours. The house filled with the smell of a tasty Sunday lunch. Alas. nothing to eat vet! I saved a bit of fuel by adding sweet potatoes to the oven to roast at the same time. The browned bone was then put in a stock pan. & chopped onion. leeks and carrot were added with water, to simmer gently for several more hours. This is definitely a SLOW stew. but worth every minute. I saved the beef dripping that had collected in the roasting pan for use in the stew. Top Tip: Make a simple soup from some of the stock, chopped roasted sweet potato and sweetcorn, season with salt and pepper. Real stock adds so much taste to food that you don't need to be fancy

with your cooking. Cath Bromwich, a Silsden resident, is a cookery teacher and foraaer.



Early this morning, I chopped an onion and 'sweated' it slowly in a pan with half a teaspoon of the beef dripping, salt and pepper. Once cooked, I popped it in my sturdy slow cooker (or you can simmer very gently in a pan, keeping meat covered with stock). I added a tiny bit more dripping to the pan I had cooked the onions in, and turned up the heat to medium. After removing any sinews from the venison pieces, I rolled them in seasoned flour, and fried them in the pan to brown them. Once you put the meat in, leave it to brown: if you move it about, it won't, and you miss an opportunity to pick up extra flavour! Finally, I removed the meat to the slow cooker and poured the stock into the pan, scraping off the meaty residue from the bottom and heated it before adding to the meat. Now we work on tenderness: bring the stew to the gentlest of

Now we work on renderness: bring the stew to the gentiest of simmers, with the slow cooker on high for around half an hour. Both with a pan & slow cooker you want a few tiny bubbles popping on the surface, but barely visible. I turned the dial to low and let the whole thing muss away doing its thing until tea time (7-8 hours), interrupting only at midday to add a couple of heaped spoonful's of sloe and crab-apple jelly . The whole house was filled with a beautiful bouquet...

When you are ready to cook your accompanying vegetables for tea, have a taste: if the meat is tender and there is enough seasoning, then you are ready to go.

Ingredients

Stock: Beef bone, roasted; 1 onion, 1 leek, 1 carrot (water to cover) For the stew: One onion chopped fine, flour, salt, pepper, 1 tsp beef dripping, 500g stewing chunks of venison, approximately 500ml beef stock, 2 large spoonfuls of sloe and crabapple jelly. Cook your sloe stew slow...

The poppy has a long association with Remembrance Day. But how did the distinctive red flower become

such a potent symbol of our remembrance of the sacrifices made in past wars?

Scarlet corn poppies (popaver rhoeas) grow naturally in conditions of disturbed earth throughout Western Europe. The destruction brought by the Napoleonic wars of the early 19th Century transformed bare land into fields of blood red poppies, growing around the bodies of the fallen soldiers. In late 1914, the fields of Northern France and Flanders were once again ripped open as World War One raged through Europe's heart. Once the conflict was over the poppy was one of the only plants to grow on the otherwise barren battlefields.

The significance of the poppy as a lasting memorial symbol to the fallen was realised by the Canadian surgeon John McCrae in his poem In Flanders Fields. The poppy came to represent the immeasurable sacrifice made by his comrades and quickly became a lasting memorial to those who died in World War One and later conflicts. It was adopted by The Royal British Legion as the symbol for their Poppy Appeal, in aid of those serving in the British Armed Forces, after its formation in 1921. As a member of West Riding Ramblers I did a survey of the footpaths in South Silsden parish a couple of years back. Most of the problems I reported

complete lack of signage. Most of these remain unresolved, and the townspeople not unnaturally feel reluctant to walk along a marked footpath from a main road only to find themselves lost a couple of fields in.

It occurred to me then to create short circular walks entirely within and throughout the parish, around $3\frac{1}{2}$

miles long, signed with distinctive way mark discs, properly mapped and described on quality gloss paper, available free of charge from distribution points in the town.

I have written to Rambling Celebs Janet Street-Porter, Julia Bradbury and Clare Balding inviting them to spend the afternoon of the launch of Silsden Strolls (Saturday 7 March 2015). It would be marvelous if just one of them could boost what is not merely a means to greater awareness and use of the town's footpath heritage, but also an excellent way of maintaining good health and attracting more tourists to the town.
