



Oh What a Lovely War!

On the 18th & 19th of May, Haworth once again turned the clock back to the 1940's. Record crowds turned out dressed in Grandma's Sunday best with many hundreds of people in war time uniforms to enjoy two days celebrating the 70th anniversary of the iconic Dambusters raids. The organisers had worked long and hard to turn the Parsonage car park into RAF Haworth, complete with a full size replica Spitfire and the magnificent 36.7 litre Griffon aero engine that made the ground shake each time it started up.

A superb Dambusters exhibition, complete with a bouncing bomb, stalls and the ENSA troupe went with a swing. Meanwhile, in Central Park there were period vehicles, music, from the ENSA Troupe, dancing,

more stalls plus the veterans beer tent. Main Street had a further display of period vehicles and was used for parades and marching bands. Naturally all our usual traders were there to provide shopping opportunities, food and drink.

Saturday started wet,

but despite chilly winds, visitors kept coming and by lunchtime the venues filled with happy people. On Sunday, the skies cleared and

turned up to see
the show and enjoy
the fly past by the
lone Hurricane that
made three exciting
passes over the
village. These vintage
aeroplanes are now
rare and increasingly
difficult to maintain
in an airworthy
condition, so it was

a real pleasure to be "buzzed" for the first time in recent years.

This year, SSAFA (the Soldiers, Sailors & Airmen's Families Association) was the chosen charity which has a branch in Keighley that does excellent work with our serving and



retired forces personnel and their families.

To commemorate the Dambusters raid, the organisers commissioned 70 limited edition

prints of Lancaster T for Tommy dropping its bouncing bomb on the Sorpe dam. Happily we still have a surviving British crew member, 91 year old bomb aimer George "Johnny Johnson" who had signed each of the 70 numbered prints. These were on

sale for £100 each and most sold over the weekend. There are just a few left offered on a first come first served basis.

The organisers would like to thank all the members of the various committees and event marshals who made the weekend go safely and with a swing and also all the advertisers and also the traders who have so kindly donated a percentage of their weekend profits to SSAFA.

CUSTOMER SERVICE THE WAY IT 'USED TO BE'?

Please accept my humble apologies for the topic of this month's 'Tech Tips'. It's not about anything techie! It's about Service, with a hint of food and fashion!

If you actually prefer the scripted 'robot-like' customer service offered by unskilled, inexperienced, sullen 'burger flippers' or completely faceless 'call centre drones' over good old fashioned service with a smile, provided by experienced and knowledgeable people, please turn the page, because there's nothing for you here!

In tough economic times most businesses are looking to save money wherever they can. First under the axe is proper customer service.

In this techno-focused world contacting a customer service or support helpdesk has become the bane of our lives, but if you're anything like me you'll avoid it until you absolutely have to. They don't want your call at all, you know. They want to cut the number of support staff to the bare minimum so they can continue to offer the cheapest broadband or phone service for the next 10 minutes, whilst still retaining a massive profit.

They really don't care if you switch supplier at the earliest opportunity and never go back. There's plenty more people queuing up to save a few quid on their car insurance/mobile phone/broadband/electricity/gas. Customer retention is not in their best interests. Long-term customers have 'expectations' they want fulfilling.

In my mid-teens I was fortunate to learn customer services skills in a diverse range of settings. I Working in a large fast food chain was utterly soul-destroying. 'Customer service' meant 'scripted everything', from flipping the burgers on the beep and giving the fries a jiggle when the buzzer went off to asking if the customer would 'like fries

with that?'! It only took 6 weeks of repeating myself, before I had to get out and regrow my brain.

I worked in a proper café and tearoom in Harrogate after that, where, if you made the effort to provide genuinely attentive, friendly and professional service, the rewards were handsome indeed. It was much harder work and longer hours, but by gosh it was worth the aching feet, and I don't mean

just financially. I learned that interacting with customers and turning them into regulars is the route to success and happiness.

In a restaurant I don't want my meal plonked down in front of me at the same time as having the word 'Enjoy' grunted by a creature that hasn't even made any eye contact. This is not good customer service. The only tip they'll get from

me is 'Plant your potatoes later this year...' and I won't return.

In a supermarket we shouldn't expect the staff to advise on the best beer to use for a beef in ale pie. If you want a top quality steak and possibly some advice on how to cook it as well, try a professional butcher. It's amazing what they know. If you want a well cut and hardwearing suit forget 'Primani', and visit a proper tailor instead.

It's the same with technology. Cheap broadband does not include friendly and helpful support from properly trained technicians, because that's the bit that costs. A smile costs nothing, but it's not reasonable to expect poor souls trapped in a sweaty call centre to sound happy when you're their 100th angry customer of the day.

Why not switch to a supplier that charges just a little bit more? You're more likely to get experienced support technicians with 'a smile in their voice' and better value for money service, so you'll be happier as a result too.



COUNTRY COOKING & FORAGING FOR FOOD

For the promotion of Health & Wellbeing by Cath Bromwich



I love elderflower cordial. Elder has a strong place in English history, there are lots of traditions about it and many uses including hollowing out twigs to make whistles.

This time of year the edible elderflowers begin to emerge and can be used for a variety of dishes and later in the year the near black berries can be baked in crumbles, but are a bit pippy so add a few to apple crumble for best results.

A traditional flavouring marriage is elderflower and gooseberry. You eat gooseberries, green and tart, with the elderflower head cooked in amongst the fruit. They are in season together and are a delicious combination, in a puff pastry tart, crumble or just stewed. Other possible desserts using the flower head aroma includes elderflower sorbet or deep frying the flower heads in a batter and dusting with sugar; Very Italian! I've also had a very tempting elderflower and vodka aperitif.


If you do make elderflower cordial then for reasonably little effort you can halve the cost of the shop bought variety. I think it tastes much better too. You can also bottle it for gifts.

As soon as you see the beautiful creamy coloured flower heads on the bushes make the cordial, because if you leave it until the season is ending the flowers smell of cat wee! (I have experience of this!) Another reason to be ready is that you need to order citric acid from the pharmacy, as it is an aid to drug-taking they don't keep large stocks.

Get all your ingredients ready then take a walk where you have seen elder bushes. Take a plastic bag and some scissors, the usual foragers' tools. You will find large elder bushes in hedgerows as you walk along a footpath. Their green leaves are oval and pointed with serrated edges and are about 5 cm long. Tiny flowers are on stalked umbrella sprays. Each umbrella flower cluster or head can be anything up to 15 cm across. When a bush is in flower it will be covered in them. Enjoy!

Tip: Freeze cordial in plastic bottles or as ice cubes for later in the year.

2 lemons

From A Year of Family Recipes by
Lesley Wild Makes 2 litres to be diluted
20 large elderflower heads,
1.8kg of granulated sugar,
1 litre water,
75g citric acid,

Put the flower heads into a large bowl. Put the sugar and water in a large, heavy-based pan and place over a low heat. Stir until the sugar is dissolved and then bring to the boil. Remove from the heat and stir in the citric acid. Allow to cool and then pour over the flower heads.

Remove the yellow zest (not the inner white because this is bitter.) from the lemons then roughly chop the lemons.

Add zest and fruit to the mixture. Stir, cover and leave somewhere cool for 24 hours. Strain and bottle in sterilized bottles.



Every year hundreds of people come to Oxenhope to take part in the Straw Race. Teams of two make their way around the village, quenching their thirst with a pint in each of the five pubs along the route whilst carrying a straw bale!

On race day the village has a true party atmosphere with hundreds of spectators turning out, come rain or shine, to watch the 250 teams, mostly in fancy dress, complete the course. Teams can spend anywhere from 30 minutes to 4 hours plus completing the course although there are some 'serious' athletes who run the 2.6 mile course. The record finish time of 14 minutes is held by Will Smith and Ian Holmes.

The main purpose of the race is to raise much needed funds for local charities. Our main beneficiary is Manorlands in Oxenhope



but we also support many other charities including Haworth Riding for the Disabled; Oxenhope Preschool; the British Heart Foundation and the Parkinson's Disease Society to name but a few. Over the past 30 years we have donated over £350,000.

The race is organised every year by a small group of local people who rely on the generosity of the local pubs, the Social Club and several local businesses, most notably McDowell Transport, Wyedean Weaving and Hodgson's Transport to make the day a success. On the day itself other local organisations, including scout groups, the police, St John's Ambulance and the Keighley Scout Service Team, join forces with us to pull pints, staff checkpoints, marshall the route and direct traffic and spectators to ensure the day runs smoothly whatever the weather.
