

COUNTRY COOKING & FORAGING FOR FOOD

For the promotion of Health & Wellbeing by Cath Bromwich



The first cooking experience I really remember was squatting at the knee of Mrs. Ganga, absorbing

the fabulous aromas of the spices, garlic and ginger, as she was grinding on the large flat stone mortar & pestle. I looked adoringly at her and longingly at the spices and wanted to know more... That is how I learnt my spices in Nepali.

Mrs Ganga died a few years ago, but the last time I saw her in Nepal, I cooked with her and this curry recipe is what we made. More recently, my kitchen has been filled with these familiar pungent African aromas as I have been fundraising following the tragic earthquakes that shook the country in which I spent so much of my childhood. Ingredients:

2 Tablespoons oil, ½ teaspoon fenugreek seeds (Methi),
1 onion, ½ Teaspoon turmeric, ½ -1 teaspoon salt,
500g Chicken thigh or breast meat, diced
1-5 Garlic cloves, 1 inch ginger, 2 chopped tomatoes
1-2 Tablespoons chopped coriander leaf
1 Teaspoon cumin powder, 2 teaspoons coriander powder

MRS GANGA'S NEPALI CHICKEN CURRY



Instructions:

Heat the oil, add ½ teaspoon fenugreek & brown for a few seconds

Add the onion, thinly sliced, cook on high heat until brown 'dots' on onions (i.e. do not brown but catch them just before this point!)

Add $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoon turmeric & $\frac{1}{2}$ -1 teaspoon salt.

Add the chicken, turn heat down to medium, regularly stirring.

Make a paste of the garlic & ginger, add to not.

Add tomatoes, a little water & simmer gently.

Add the chopped coriander leaves, the cumin powder & the coriander powder

Add about half a cup of water & simmer until chicken is cooked (breast will be cooked quickly, the chicken leg meat will need to be simmered very gently for longer, up to an hour even, just keep testing & tasting it!). Taste for seasoning. Serve with rice & dahl











Contact the Elderly, a charity which aims to combat loneliness and isolation felt by people over 75, is appealing for more volunteers in Keighley and Aire Valley. Sunday tea parties are organised once a month for older guests living alone who need a helping hand to get out and socialise. Volunteer drivers pick up older guests from their home and escort them safely to the home of a volunteer host. The host. provides tea, cake and, of course, lots of friendly conversation. The groups are small, around six to eight older guests, so people can make friends locally. The tea parties are a real lifeline for older people who suffer from loneliness and often cannot leave home unaided. Drivers volunteer once a month and hosts volunteer once or twice a year. 






Points of Interest Along the Way

Leeds and Liverpool Canal

At 127 miles in length it is the longest man made waterway in Britain and forms part of a through route between the Irish and North Seas. Work on the canal started circa 1770 and took 40 years to link Leeds and Liverpool at a cost of £1.25m. The section between Hirst Lock and Bingley, which our route follows, opened in 1774;



however, the canal did not reach Leeds. until 1776. Between Leeds and Liverpool there are 53 swing bridges and 91 staircase type locks. The lock gates are made of English Oak and have to withstand the thrust of 90,000 gallons of water; they have an expected life span of 50 years. Bradford was linked to the Leeds and Liverpool Canal via the 31/2 mile long Bradford Canal (closed in the 1920's). The route ran parallel with Canal Road between Shipley and the city. A small section of the canal remains and can be seen running through the Boars Well Nature Reserve, which is situated off Kings Road along the bottom of the hillside behind the Audi and

The River Aire

Rising above Malham in the Yorkshire Dales, the 76 mile long river, which forms the southern boundary of the dales, enters the Bradford District to the west, between Kildwick and Silsden. Its 15 mile journey through the district takes in Keighley, Bingley, Saltaire and Shipley before leaving at Apperley Bridge in the east. Continuing its journey to the North Sea via Leeds, Castleford and Ferrybridge to join the River Ouse and the Humber, near Goole. The recent return of the otter to parts of the river indicates the continuing improvement in water quality.

Bingley Relief Road

After many decades of planning, deliberation, procrastination and protests, the 21/2 mile road opened on Monday 22nd December 2003 at a cost of £47.9m. Views of the bypass can be seen along our walk route, which goes over and under two of the roads main structures. It is estimated that 30,000 vehicles will use the road each day.

June sees the start of our period of operation for seven days per week, so we know that summer has definitely arrived [whatever the weather!].

Over the years we have tried to adapt out operation to suit passengers' requirements, so we have changed the summer weekday timetable to mean that the first steam train will now leave Oxenhope at 10am and Keighley at

10.40am. Whilst the timetable change results in our last trains of the day also being earlier (leaving Oxenhope at 3pm and Keighley at 3.45pm), it means that we can now offer a steam service before lunchtime from Keighley. It also means a very, very early start to light the engines,

with at least one volunteer having to be on duty from well before 5am...

This early morning start is just one example of how we are striving to keep The Railway Children's Railway up to date and relevant, bringing the history of the steam railway to life for a new generation of passengers. This is especially relevant as we near 2018, which will mark our 50th year since the branch line reopened for services in June 1968.

With each year that passes, we are further from the era when passengers and volunteers are able to remember first-hand the era of steam travel on the main line, so to continue to attract visitors and to respond to today's passenger demands requires us to keep developing and improving the Railway's passenger facilities. Plans are well-advanced for a new café at Oxenhope, to refurbish the water tower and washroom facilities at Keighley,

and we have ambitious plans for our engineering facilities at Haworth. All this is going on whilst our volunteers continue to restore 50+ year old steam locomotives and maintain a fleet of historic carriages to keep the core service operating.

What these plans mean is that whilst we continue to welcome

volunteers to operational and commercial roles, such as those that wish to train as footplate crew or to help staff the shops, we urgently need more volunteers to help us manage and help coordinate the numerous initiatives that we need to progress. Please do get in touch if you have relevant skills and experience and would be willing to help us prepare the Railway for its next 50 years of operation.
